Archer Roose Canned Wines

Actress Elizabeth Banks didn't just put her name on this...she signed on as co-owner because she wanted a wine she could pull from a cooler on a beach day. Seven varietals, globally sourced, no added sugar, and a can that goes wherever a glass can't.



Domaine Bousquet Natural Origins Organic Malbec (boxed)

Organic Malbec from Argentina's high-altitude Uco Valley...no oak, just fresh, bright fruit from sustainably farmed grapes. The bag-in-box format keeps it drinkable for weeks after you open it, which gives you real flexibility over a long holiday weekend.



Innocent Bystander Sauvignon Blanc (screwcap)

Six hours of skin contact before fermentation, letting the juice soak up aromatics before any heat touches it, gives this Tasmanian Sauvignon Blanc more range than its easygoing reputation suggests. Simply twist off the top and pour.



Casal Garcia Vinho Branco (can)

Vinho Verde is Portugal's summer wine, and Casal Garcia's classic version — 9.5% alcohol with a natural light spritz — comes in a can that was basically designed for boat coolers and lakeside afternoons. Cold, citrusy, and everything you'd want on a lake day for under \$10.



Sandy Giovese Vino Rosso (boxed)

Named after the founder's daughter, Sandy Giovese puts organic Italian Sangiovese in a box light enough to drink slightly chilled. The New York Times called it one of the boxed wines worth taking seriously, and three liters works out to four bottles at under \$10 each.



Schlink Grüner Veltliner 3L Box

Grüner Veltliner is Austria's signature white — herbaceous, mineral, and built for a table — and this one comes from a family winery that's been farming the same Austrian vineyards since 1721. VinePair named it the best box wine of 2023.
